Currently there is a hand dug well on the school site, which is not deep enough to provide a continuous supply of clean water to the school. We need to raise money so that machines can be used to make the well deep enough to reach the clean water.

How does a borehole work?

A water borehole taps into aquifers, which are underground stores of water created by rainfall and evaporation in permeable geological matter. A seal near the top of the borehole closes the drill hole to the pipe and this prevents surface water, which may be polluted, from entering the borehole.

Things are changing in Zambia

54 years after independence, has one of the world's fastest growing, if still relatively small, economies.

People's life expectancy, education level and income are improving. More than half of the country under the age of 25, there's a lot of energy and optimism for the future.

However, this progress has not been shared equally among Zambians. A huge proportion of people, 6 in 10, still live below the poverty line, and the gap between rich and poor is widening.

l in 10 people are affected by HIV/AIDS and even more are disabled. They are particularly at risk from the lack of clean water and decent, accessible toilets across the country.
